

## The Invasion of Haverford Township (from the archives)

During the British occupation of Philadelphia in 1777-8, the residents of Haverford Township were subjected to the only invasion by foreign troops in the history of the Township.

It appears that the British under Cornwallis did not prefer making raids on the communities surrounding Philadelphia. They would much rather have had the cooperation of our farmers to the extent that plenty of food for themselves and their horses would be brought into the city and sold in the market places. However, either from fear of personal injury and loss of their goods or from feeling of patriotic necessity, very little of the farm products reached Philadelphia during the British occupation.

Finally, the British, angered by what they considered a lack of cooperation, decided to take what they needed by force and during the winter of 1777 made four raids on the Haverford farmers and residents in general. It is recorded that they found our community an area of astonishing prosperity, barns crowded with stock and stores of crops, houses with large stocks of food and every evidence of a happy self-sustaining population.

The raids took place on December 10, 11, 12 and 17<sup>th</sup>, when not only were their homes robbed of food stuffs, but in addition, items of clothing, tools, livestock and even such personal items as combs, soap, kitchen implements, pots, pans and dishes. In fact, it appeared that every effort was made to prevent our home folk from being able to continue their existence except by being in dire need and if it had not been for the spending response offered by their neighbors who had escaped these raids, they would have been reduced to a very pitiful condition.

After the Revolution was over and peace once again was established, our government agreed to recompense all individuals for following notice was displayed in certain public places "In pursuance of an act of assembly passed the 21<sup>st</sup> of September 1782, the commissioners of every county of Pennsylvania that had been invaded by the British, are directed to call on the assessors, to procure and return accounts and estimates of the damages that had been done by the enemy since the 18<sup>th</sup> of April 1775."

### Volunteer Corner – by Amy Wolfe

In 1961 the dedication of the reconstructed Lawrence Cabin included a flag ceremony led by Havertown Girl Scout Troop 501. One of the Scouts present that day was Irene Coffey. Fast forward to 2017 and Irene "Renee" Coffey is the President of the Haverford Township Historical Society.

Renee's father grew up in the Township. She grew up listening to his stories of the '20s, which led her to develop an interest in her paternal genealogy. An affinity for historical fiction and an invitation from long- time volunteer and board President Margaret "Peg" Johnston found Renee joining the HTHS Board around 1994. Over the years she has served as a Director at Large, Vice President and President.



A career librarian, Renee's work at the libraries of Temple University, The University of Pennsylvania, Rosemont College and The Franklin Institute left her eminently qualified to tackle the cataloguing of the 600 volumes of the Historical Society collection. The collection primarily addresses the history of Haverford Township and Delaware County, and also includes old educational materials. The collection, housed in the library of Nitre Hall is important, says Renee, because "it reveals the social culture in generations past. The books give a whole different view of standards, values and norms of previous times."

Renee's work at the Franklin Institute fostered her interest in historical research. A project of which she is particularly proud concerned the Sheaff family. They were Haverford Township residents whose two sons fought in the Civil War. As a result of her research Renee was able to connect a pair of third cousins who previously were unknown to each other.

Over the years Renee has been involved in grant writing for the Nitre Hall stucco, the reconstruction of the front porch, and the CAP (Conservation Assessment Program) Grant, which resulted in the Nitre Hall Preservation Plan. As President, Renee has worked tirelessly to further the interests of the Society with Haverford Township, fostered relationships with the Haverford Township Free Library and local civic and historical organizations, spearheaded improvement and restoration projects for Nitre Hall, Lawrence Cabin and the Federal School, and dealt with the countless details necessary for the functioning of a vibrant and successful organization. Husband Jim, Renee says, is "extremely supportive of my activities."

Renee states that her greatest satisfaction comes from the progress that the Society has made in reaching out to the community, her work on the filing and records projects, the restorations to the buildings and expansion of the collections. "I think for a small, volunteer organization we are doing an impressive and valuable amount of work."

### Native American Artifact Collection by Amy Wolfe

Visitors to Nitre Hall are invited to examine the Society's newly mounted Native American Artifact Exhibit. This exciting collection is on permanent display in the library.

In the spring of 2017 local archeologist and volunteer Mike Lenert, husband of board member Deb Lenert, completed an examination of nearly one hundred artifacts recovered in Haverford Township and gifted to the Society. He identified each item by age, material and function. They include projectile points, knives, hand mauls, stone axes and pestles, and were used for woodworking, hunting, butchering and food preparation. Also in the collection are a few pottery sherds and an ornamental pendant.

The items were crafted by the Lenni Lenape, the indigenous people of the region. Mike found that the artifacts date from a few hundred to several thousand years ago, a humble reminder that the history of our area did not begin with the arrival of Europeans. "We live in such a wonderfully historic town," says Mike, "and now this collection clearly documents a human past in our township that stretches even farther back into history!"

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### Jefferson Street Ballparks Historical Marker

On Saturday, September 30, 2017, a new Pennsylvania Historical Marker was dedicated to the Jefferson Street Ballparks, located on Jefferson Street near the Athletic Recreation Center in Philadelphia. The dedication was the culmination of a year-and-a-half long research and fundraising campaign led by **Havertown resident Matt Albertson**, a Villanova alumnus and member of the Society for American Baseball Research (SABR). Matt is also an active member of the Athletic Base Ball Club of Philadelphia (pictured right) as well as our Historical Society.

JEFFERSON STREET BALLPARKS

The Jefferson Street Grounds and later Athletic Park hosted several monumental games here. Early civil rights activist Octavius Catto captained the Pythians against the white Olympic ball club in 1869-the first interracial baseball game.
