

Llanerch Crossing Park Dedication Friday, October 5 at 7 pm

The era of the trolley – the modern answer to the horse and buggy

Transformation of the triangular property at West Chester Pike and Darby Roads – long an eyesore – is nearing completion. The dream of a welcoming park has been accomplished through the efforts of 2nd Ward Commissioner Mario Oliva and an energetic and dedicated band of citizens, Boy Scouts and township workers. This highly visible corner at the southeastern edge of our township now commemorates the battle of Llanerch Crossing, a railroad rights fight between the Pennsylvania Railroad and the West Chester Traction Company in 1895. Railroad historian and author of The Red Arrow, Ronald DeGraw noted that the West Chester Traction Company was the only private company to successfully make inroads on PRR territory.

For commuters and leisure travelers, Llanerch Junction was long a rail transportation hub with connections to be made to Philadelphia, West Chester, Newtown and Ardmore Junction. The Ardmore Line lasted well into the mid 20th century, and the rail bed of the PRR can still be seen paralleling Railroad Avenue and behind the present Kohl's store on West Chester Pike.



From the archives...Brookthorpe Mansion



The gracious mansion once just off Darby Road at College Avenue and known as "Brookthorpe" from 1921 until 1967, stood on land originally granted to John Bevan as part of the Welsh Tract. Over the next two hundred years, the acreage was divided and became the farms of John Lindsay and William Brooke, known as the Lindsay Farm and "Greenbank." Eventually the descendants of these early settlers added to the parcel creating "Brookthorpe Farms." Merion Cricket Club purchased some of this land for golf links; the estate of Stuart Wood and Atwater Kent's "Foxcroft" were carved from it. The Haverford State Hospital grounds are on the tract. Brookthorpe itself became The Mitchell School, was owned for a short time by Mr. and Mrs. H. Gates Lloyd and eventually was purchased by Marriott Corporation for the Quadrangle cottages. Brookthorpe, the mansion designed by architect George Shephard was even a Vassar show house in 1967.

Perhaps the most interesting residents of Brookthorpe were the J. Stanley Reeve family. Mr. Reeve and his wife, built their home in 1921 and lived there until 1961. In the prosperous era following WWI, life at Brookthorpe revolved around tennis, riding, lavish entertainment requiring numerous live-in servants, the beautiful gardens and above all the hunt. The Radnor Hunt was nearby and Mr. Reeve was an avid member. Born in 1878, J. Stanley Reeve was a Quaker from New Jersey. In 1908 he published "Rhubarb The Diary of a Gentleman's Hunter" and the following primer in The Sportsman in 1929, entitled "Fox Hunting Formalities." Mr. Reeve may have been a stickler for formality, but his rules for hunt behavior seem all in good fun today. The next time you sight a fox or hear its cry, remember that foxhunting was once a passionate pastime in our township.



FOXCATCHER DON'TS

- Do not wear a ratcatcher to an opening meet or scarlet on a cub-hunting morning.
- Nothing looks worse than a big flask on one side and a sandwich box on the other. Do not strew the paper from your sandwich box all about the countryside.
- Arrive ten minutes before the hounds are scheduled to start...do not take a short-cut through likely coverts.
- When the Master walks past you, lift your hat to him as you do to a lady or when passing a coach and four...Don't ask him where he expects to draw....Where he intends hounds to draw is his and his huntsman's affair, and not yours.
- Let the M.F.H. ride to covertside alone. Keep at least a hundred feet behind him; then if a hound is emptying itself, you won't be so likely to override it.
- Never smoke a pipe until you are hacking home.
- If you override the hounds, do not tell the Master you could not hold your horse. Simply say, Sorry'...Remember for the rest of your hunting life that a horse you cannot hold is the poorest of excuses for overriding hounds.
- When you sight the fox say, "Yonder he goes." Say it
 quietly and make sure first that it is a fox and not a cat
 or a cur dog. Don't say 'There is goes.' Don't get
 excited.
- Remember that foxes have been viewed and hallooeed away for centuries. It is nothing new.
- When the fox goes to ground, do not ride up to the earth and try to look into it. There is nothing to see, only a hole. If you insist on making yourself useful, ask the huntsman if you may hold his horse for him.

Maintenance and Upkeep

1797 Federal School

Just in time for last spring's Federal School Program, a new section of floor was installed by Greg Basile after <u>Vince Cunningham of Cunningham Pest Control</u> treated the building for termites. Mr. Cunningham provided his services free of charge, and the Historical Society greatly appreciates this community service. Thanks also to <u>Mr. Basile</u>, whose prompt attention to this matter allowed Federal School Program classes to take place without interruption.

Lawrence Cabin Area Improved

In another instance of the support HTHS receives from the community, Boy Scout Travis Wolfe completed his Eagle Scout project this summer in and around Lawrence Cabin. With the assistance of many volunteers that he recruited, Travis installed stairs, built a retaining wall and planted liriope on the sloped bank behind Lawrence Cabin. This project allows for safer access to the cabin and will prevent erosion of the soil behind the cabin. Thank you, Travis, for all your hard work!


Fireplace and Chimney Restoration at Nitre Hall

The warmth of a cheery fire will greet guests at the December 2nd Holiday Open House this year. A yearlong project to restore Nitre Hall's three fireplaces and two chimneys to safe working order was completed in September. In keeping with our long-range maintenance plan for Nitre Hall, the Historical Society engaged the architectural services of John Milner Architects, Inc. and The County Sweep, Inc. to accomplish this important task. The chimneys were pointed where necessary, capped and lined. New dampers were installed for each flu. Smoke chambers between the fireboxes and chimneys were lined with insulating mortar and the fireboxes repaired and finished with a simulated whitewash. The brick hearths were cleaned and reset.

Funding was provided by Haverford Township and the Historical Society. A complete record, documenting the repairs is on file at Nitre Hall.
