




### June 10 Ribbon Cutting Ceremony for the Haverford Heritage Trail at the Grange

More than fifty hiking and history enthusiasts gathered on Sunday June 10 for the official opening of the Haverford Heritage Trail. ## **Cataloging History:**

A Story of Books

The Historical Society is in the midst of an ambitious project to catalogue our extensive book collection.

The Historical Society owns between 500 and 1,000 books, most of them housed in Nitre Hall. A wide variety of subjects are represented in the collection, including histories of Haverford Township and neighboring Delaware County townships, life in the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries, Welsh Quakers, school books on both the elementary and secondary level – primarily in the fields of literature, language arts, mathematics, and geography – and family Bibles. Many of the books are over 100 years old; the oldest one discovered so far is A collection of the sufferings of the people called Quakers by Joseph Besse, dating from 1753.

Currently, the collection is loosely arranged by subject. The Society has a database of its book collection which is accessible by both author and an abbreviated title. We have begun a project to thoroughly catalog the entire collection, using the Library of Congress' Classification System. To date, 200 books have been cataloged.

During the cataloging process, each book is examined in order to accurately determine the exact edition we own, to establish its provenance, or history - who owned it before we did - and to note any distinguishing characteristics of the copy we own. Those characteristics can include the fact that it has a tooled leather binding or that a student used the end papers to do his math computations! We consult with the Library of Congress' catalog and with the Worldcat database, which gives us access to libraries all across the country, to find an edition that matches ours so we can add the correct call number and subject headings to our database. Pagination, illustrations, size, publisher, date and place of publication and other significant details are also recorded. Sometimes, another cataloged

copy is not found and it is necessary to work out the call number and subject headings independently. Acid free ID strips, with the book's call number, author, and title recorded on the strip in permanent ink, are prepared and inserted into each book. The call number section sticks up above the book to facilitate arrangement and retrieval.

Detailed descriptions of the physical condition of each volume are included in the cataloging record. Are the pages brittle or stained? Is the cover detached? Are there loose or torn pages? This information will enable us to identify the books most in need of preservation based on their age, rarity, and condition. For now, those that are losing their covers or breaking apart are tied with unbleached cotton tape to ensure that none of the parts are lost.

On average, it takes an hour to catalog each book. The project will take several years to complete but will provide many benefits. We will know exactly how many books we have in the collection. We will have a more precise picture of the subject areas covered because the newly assigned call numbers will organize the books into clear subject groups. We will know which books need to be repaired and conserved. Using the call numbers in the database and in the books, it will be possible to locate a book instantly rather than browsing the shelves. Most important, it will be much easier to access and use this resource to enhance our programs. Ultimately, we hope to make knowledge of and access to the collection available to Historical Society members, township residents, and researchers.


## **Grounds Maintenance – Taking Care of our Historic Sites**
